Reducing exposure and transmission of Coronavirus	Staff, students, and visitors	As normal, we will provide immunisation programmes on site, ensuring these will be delivered in keeping with our control measures. 1) Ensure good hygiene for everyone • Hand hygiene- frequent and thorough hand cleaning is already a regular practice now. We will continue to ensure that students clean their hands regularly. Sanitiser will be throughout the school at entrances to buildings and in all classrooms, offices and other shared spaces. • Respiratory hygiene- the 'catch it, bin it, kill it' approach continues to be very important. Tissues and lidded bins are in all shared spaces. Students are reminded regularly of good respiratory hygiene techniques. 2) Maintain appropriate cleaning regimes, using standard products such as detergents- • Rooms/shared areas, frequently touched surfaces (door handles, touch plates, light switches, lift buttons etc) and toilets will continue to be cleaned regularly and frequently Individual and frequently used equipment such as pens and pencils should not be shared. Classroom-based resources which are shared are either left for 72 hours between use or cleaned between use for each group wherever practical • Resources shared between classes such as sports, arts and science equipment will be cleaned frequently and meticulously or rotated to allow them to be left unused for a period of 48 hours (72 hours for plastics) wherever practical • Cleaning wipes in all classrooms for teacher's desk spaces		2	3	(2X3) +3 = 9 (Low)

3) Keep occupied spaces well ventilated

- Where possible, all occupied spaces to be well ventilated using natural ventilation (opening windows) or ventilation units
- Occupied classroom doors to be left open to limit use of door handles and aid ventilation
- Staff workrooms and offices to be occupied by limited numbers maintaining a 1 metre distance between colleagues. All shared workrooms to be ventilated by window and door when occupied
- Ongoing monitoring of ventilation and building temperature. Heating systems used to ensure comfort levels are maintained in occupied spaces to ensure good ventilation is maintained

4) Follow public health advice on testing, self-isolation and managing confirmed cases of COVID-19

Symptoms:

- Students, staff and visitors should not come into school if they have symptoms, have had a positive test result or other reasons requiring them to stay at home due to the risk of them passing on COVID-19 (for example, they are required to quarantine).
- If anyone in the school develops COVID-19 symptoms, however mild, they should be sent home (not via public transport wherever possible) and told to self-isolate and follow the stay at home guidance including taking a test. Any household members should also follow this guidance. Any student with symptoms awaiting collection should be left in the small meeting room (behind Reception) room on their own if possible and safe to do so. The door should remain open while the room is occupied. Appropriate PPE should also be used if close contact is necessary. The room will be cleaned thoroughly once vacated.

Asymptomatic Testing:

 For as long as national guidelines require, staff and secondary students should continue to test regularly if they are attending settings that remain open, such as summer schools and out of school activities based in school settings.

		 Staff should undertake twice weekly home tests whenever they are on site until this is reviewed and amended nationally. Confirmatory PCR Tests: Staff and students with a positive LFD test result should self-isolate in line with the stay at home guidance. They will also need to get a free PCR test to check if they have Covid-19. Whilst awaiting the PCR result, the individual should continue to self-isolate. If the PCR test is taken within 2 days of the positive lateral flow test, and is negative, it overrides the self-test LFD test and the student can return to school, as long as the individual doesn't have COVID-19 symptoms. 			
		 Close Contact Tracing: From Step 4, close contacts are identified via NHS Test and Trace and education settings are no longer be expected undertake contact tracing From 16 August 2021, children under the age of 18 years old are no longer required to self-isolate if they are contacted by NHS Test and Trace as a close contact of a positive COVID-19 case. Instead, children will be contacted by NHS Test and Trace, informed they have been in close contact with a positive case and advised to take a PCR test. 18-year-olds will be treated in the same way as children until 4 months after their 18th birthday, to allow them the opportunity to get fully vaccinated. At which point, they will be subject to the same rules as adults and so if they choose not to get vaccinated, they will need to self-isolate if identified as a close contact. 			
		 Social distancing: In line with the LA recommendations students and staff will be encouraged to maintain the 1m+ rule wherever possible (people to stay at least a metre away from each other with measures in place to limit the transmission of Covid-19. Measures include; facing way from each other and the increased use of hand sanitisers).
